
Did Someone Say Island Hopping



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















Having been to some of the very best all inclusive resorts and non-all inclusive resorts around the globe, I must say that I tend to be extremely discerning. Visiting S Hotel this year came just at the right time. Needing a little R&R before delving back into the fray of a hectic travel month, I thought that slipping S Hotel in would be the perfect respite that I was seeking. The last time I visited, the hotel was in its pre-opening days. I remembered the vision of Chrsitopher Issa, the owner, being conveyed to me as we walked (briskly) through the matte white walls that rose above the famed "Hip Strip" of Montego Bay. It was a bright idea to create the hotel's foundation as a blank canvas. Once you visit you'll see exactly why. It not only lets the guests have a perfect backdrop to the glistening Caribbean Sea but allows the artwork that is rampant throughout the property to pop and stand out. Uniquely Jamaican statuary and art pieces are everywhere. The sense of place is unmistakable and as a Jamaican, I smiled at every turn. National heroes, and iconic legends pointed the way to my next S Hotel moment. Sometimes literally pointing as in the Nanny of the Maroons, the first and foremost leader of the Windward Maroons of Jamaica, an autonomous community of self-emancipated, formerly enslaved people. Seeing her statue point me in the direction of the elevator was very fitting. I was there to emancipate myself from what Bob Marley could easily have been referring to as "mental slavery" where my every thought was filled with the next step at work. His statue, Mr. Robert-Nesta Marley was also moving us along. Guitar in hand, right leg off the ground, his dreads cascading down his denim-clad shoulder was motivation for us to get up, stand up, and head right for the Irie Baths. These cleverly crafted grotto pools in a dimly lit underground setting helped me ease my way into the day. The series of three pools, each having its own temperature is designed as a hydrotherapy experience for guests. Since you have to make a reservation just to secure a time slot to use the bath, there's never a fear of overcrowding or feeling like a swimming pool. This is a very intimate and tranquil experience. The design is deliberate. The intention is to have you grounded in what surrounds this hotel. The beach upon which S hotel is built is called Doctor's Cave Beach. The spring fed waters of this beach, just steps outside of these baths, have been known for their healing properties. You feel that sense of healing within these walls.

HISTORY –according to the beach club itself.

"It began in 1906 when Dr. Alexander James McCatty generously donated his beach property to found a bathing club in Montego Bay. The Club got its name because it was used by Dr. McCatty and his friends, who were mainly from the medical profession and at that time, they entered the tiny beach through a cave. The cave, however, was destroyed by a hurricane in 1932. The water which is crystal clear has a temperature range, winter and summer, from 78 to 84 degrees Fahrenheit, 22 to 28 Celcius.

In the end of early 1920's, Sir Herbert Barker, a famous British Osteopath, visited the beach and later published an article boosting it by declaring that the waters have curative powers and that he was restored to good health after bathing there. He said the waters could cure several ailments. This heightened the allure of the beach and Doctor's Cave became famous overnight as foreigners,

many rich and famous, came to try the water. Hotels were built in the immediate vicinity and thus began the tourist trade. We are a lot more than just a great beach. We are located in the middle of Montego Bay's 'Hip Strip'."

You are immersed in Jamaica at S Hotel. Luxury is not spared while offering guests a totally Jamaican experience. I know that phrase can conjure up numerous images for each person reading the story. As a Jamaican though, I can tell you what it means to me. It means you are experiencing the authentic Jamaica. There are certain tastes, smells, colors, and textures that I associate with my childhood, growing up in Jamaica. Those to me are the real Jamaica. A specific shade of green that is undeniably JA. The smell of the rain as it begins to drift over the mountain top and head your way. This is Jamaica. There's a way of turning every song into a revised reggae hit—this is Jamaica. The taste of the food (beyond jerk) lets you know it's really Jamaican.









Looking back on the first meeting and tour that I had of this hotel and it's infancy, I recall sitting in what is now called Rocksteady, with Mr. Issa and his team including Andres Cope. There was brainstorming going on, debates on whether to make the resort all inclusive or not, but the one common thread that kept stitching everything together was authentic luxury. Now, sitting in the very same space, the fine dining restaurant called Rocksteady that offers a feast for the senses, I see the manifestation of Mr. Issa's vision. This dining establishment offers classics with freshly sourced Jamaican ingredients. A white baby grand piano is being played while dinner is served in this reservations only establishment. The white leather seating, pristine against the black walls, proudly holding framed artwork by the famed Jamaican artist Michael Thompson. The natural coral stone pillars shooting up through the white ceiling are the same natural stone found in the Irie Baths and throughout

the hotel; local coral stone for the local feel. Remember that specific shade of green I mentioned? Hopefully you can see it in your mind's eye. It's the one from the flag, the same one when you see the Rasta colors for red, green, and gold. It's painted on pushcarts, wooden signs, zinc siding, and one of the great things about it is it gives me a sense of place. Scenes of classic Jamaica painted on zinc, lining the walls of this restaurant on the roof deck keep you grounded in the destination. Serving up authentic Jamaican classics, ackee and saltfish, jerk chicken, and oxtail and more, all with the innovative S twist in this artful space. This Rohan Blair-designed restaurant is a celebration of the island's musical heritage and showcases some of the country's most influential personalities. You really cannot get more Jamaican without hitting the streets. That's the luxury of this place. You need not do that. The essence of Jamaica is found here at S.

Bobbing in the clear warm waters of the Caribbean and looking back at the white structure against the blue sky we glance up and spot our suite. Taking in the hotel from this vantage point is just as glorious as being within its walls. From the tranquil sea, the brilliant red umbrellas on the pool deck pop. The glass-walled pool on the roof is an inviting exclamation mark from any angle but from below, the cube of floating water beckons. Answering the call and venturing up to the glass encased pool surrounded by a broad wood planked deck overlooking the Caribbean Sea, this pool is a glorious testament to Jamaica being called land of wood and water by its original inhabitants. At every turn and from every angle, S Hotel captures Jamaica.

What is island life without delving into island nightlife, you ask? The answer is Club S! This isn't your typical club dolled up and housed within the confines of your resort. This is the epitome of a Jamaican club. Guests of the hotel are invited to partake in a truly immersive Jamaican nightlife experience. When we asked the concierge where Club S located, he pointed out towards the guard gate and said, "It's just over there." Pointing towards the guard gate. When we approach the guard gate and asked about the club yet again, he politely motioned us toward what looked like the entry to a shopping plaza. In true Jamaican fashion, there was no big sign on the door, and there was a well-dressed gentleman standing at the ready to open the door for us. He had seen us come directly from the hotel and knew exactly what we were looking for, and what that was was a good night out. As the door swung open and the reggae tunes drew us in to what can only be described as a perfect replica of local Jamaican dance club, my jaw dropped, and turned to my husband, and said, "This is legit." The deliberate lean-to feel with plywood walls, made to look dusty, a single bar area, stacked speakers against one wall, two intimate upstairs areas to overlook the dancefloor make this one of the best Jamaican nightclubs I have encountered in decades. S puts its stamp on everything it touches and that indelible stamp is authentic luxury. Say it with me, authentic luxury! Not sure if you read this piece wondering just how I feel about the Small Luxury Hotel, but I love it here! Well done Christopher Issa and team.





What we experienced while staying on the Dutch side and popping over to the French for dinner one evening was a lot. A little bit of pre-arrival research said there were more than 120 nationalities living on the island. Our guide mentioned that there were about 140. Truly, does it matter when you get to those types of numbers? What it said to me was St. Maarten was going to be about a lot of things. From the highest peak on this side of the island is The Flying Dutchman, where the main attraction is the steepest zipline in the world, dropping about 1,050 feet. In this context, dropping should be read zipping! From this viewpoint, you see the island laid out below you. What you may not see is how the melding of

these 100-plus nationalities blend together. For that, we recommend taking to the streets.

To get a real taste of a destination, we find answers in the flavors. On this island, we ventured out to a lolo, a lolo is a small, traditional restaurant (about 300 square feet). What we discovered was a reflection of the number of multinational inhabitants we were told about. Stopping for Doubles, the most popular street food in Trinidad, staring out at the multitude of lolos, we saw the eclectic mixture that is the backbone of St. Maarten. Dutch, Afro-Caribbean, Indian, Chinese, Spanish cuisine, and more, are authentic and at your fingertips. We went on to explore Phillipsburg, St. Maarten's capital and heartbeat of the island. It's one of our favorite spots on the island. Strolling along Front Street is a pastime in itself. Shopping, shopping is the name of the game on Front Street. Some come for tshirts, nick knacks, sarongs, and salad tongs. I come for the array of jewelry and the best duty-free prices I have come across on any island. The discounts are deep, and the abundance of designers is remarkable. It's a lot to take in, but well worth the time. We left with some great pieces at unbelievable prices. Not to sound like a television commercial about steals and deals, but, wow!







here's a lot to do and to take in on this side of the island. We went to a local school and took a Steel Pan Lesson with Mighty Dow. Here, again, we were shown the diversity of St. Maarten. Originating in Trinidad and Tobago, the steel pan is probably the Caribbean's most recognizable instrument. We were taught how to play the steel pan by the legend himself, Mighty Dow. He is a son of the soil; St. Maarten's famed steel pan artist - who founded Dow's Musical Foundation, a non-profit dedicated to preserving and showcasing the art of steel pan through lessons, workshops, events. If you can catch one of his lessons, it is highly recommended that you jump on the opportunity. This was a fun and interactive experience.

We learned to play "Hot Hot Hot", a globally recognized song written and first recorded by Montserratian musician Arrow. If he could teach us, you know he's pretty good. We were a handful, and a lot for him to handle. With music in our heads, and a pep in our step we chipped over to the We Culture Museum Experience, where we saw a lot of Carnival costumes and learned about the meaning behind some, and the evolution from fully covered to modest nudity. The vibrant history of Carnival at the world's first Caribbean Carnival experience - We Culture was a lot to take in and so much fun. The brand-new museum took us on a journey, cocktail in hand, with a 60-minute guided exploration of artwork, costumes and hands-on interactive activities







where we felt the magic of Carnival come alive. We even left with a memento that is most likely going to make an appearance this halloween. I'm putting this item away until then because finding something to match and wear on the bottom may be a challenge, unless we go the route of body paint. Stay tuned for the update on that.

n another adventure in St. Maarten, we took to the Caribbean Sea and saw a lot. Aquamania Adventures, a local shop with several locations on the island provides water excursions, from snorkeling trips and sunset sails, to day trips to neighboring islands as well as scuba diving trips. We took on snorkeling through the newest underwater

sculpture park. The Under Sint Maarten Sculpture Park is a breath-taking new attraction, in Divi Little Bay, St. Maarten. These sculptures were all made from molds of actual residents of the island. Swimming through this sculpture garden was a lot of fun. The Scantilly clad carnival dancers were probably my favorite, where we could see sea urchins attaching themselves and some very provocative and promiscuous ways. It's hard to laugh with a snorkel in your mouth, but somehow we all came up with smiles at the stories. There's a lot more to this underwater adventure, we recommend that you take it in on your next visit to St. Maarten.



He's another staple with a warm, "Welcome back!" and a wave, we feel even more at home. The simple acts of genuine warmth and incomparable hospitality make a vacation at Round Hill unmistakable and unparalleled.

We used to take Cottage 18 on this property for many years and the ladies who were the staff of that villa had been working there for decades. The former director of sales and marketing had also worked there for decades and knew us by name. These stalwarts are the gatekeepers to the most laid-back luxurious vacation one may ever take. Josef Forstmayr, the managing director, is beyond comparison. You can find him strolling the property, with a keen eye on the grounds and the guests, ensuring every detail is as it should be and the guest experience is on point. Matter of fact, he had inspected our room just before arrival and left a handwritten note welcoming us back. We actually saw him post the room inspection on Instagram, not knowing it was ours until we arrived. Talk about melding the classic standard of superior hospitality with the new technology. Talk about telling stories...the Ralph Lauren Bar, named after the designer who also happens to be one of the notable residents of Round Hill, has more stories to tell than any other nook on the property. Slip into a cozy corner for a classic cocktail while the pianist tickles the ivories and gaze at the black and white photographs in their original frames and you're immediately drawn into an era of swank and style. The swimming costumes, grinning faces, and the recognisable appearance of relaxed luxury jumps out at you. After reemerging from the captivated grasp of the past, you soon realize that you are indeed making the same indelible images and memories for future generations. Even if your images never hang on these hallowed walls, memories made at Round Hill become instant classics. The resort is crawling with nostalgia. The beach bar, built around a thriving almond tree, has been there since the start and only gets better with age. Stewart tends to the bar as though it were a child of his and takes just as good a care of those who visit him for a libation or two. The rafts anchored just off shore are a great sunbathing and people watching spot. Here, there is not the type of people watching one might do in a busy city or in Hollywood on the hunt for stars. It's the sort where you make connections. The rafts are a sort of gathering spot to strike up conversation while chilling in the sea. I do not believe that has changed one bit since 1953. Lifelong friendships have been made on this golden sand beach. We can personally attest to that.

The spa holds the same warmth and charm as the rest of the resort. The Welcome Wharf, home to the spa is an 18th-century home, meticulously renovated on over ten acres of lawn that leads to an intimate private beach. This beach is





one of our favorite for collecting seaglass, a secret shared with only a few until now. Setting foot onto this adultsonly area of the property is transformative. This, before ever having a treatment. We love grounding ourselves by kicking off our sandals and stepping on to the zoysia grass, dotted with fallen almonds from the shade trees strewn across the lawn. This coupled with the gentle sea breeze and the sound of rolling waves gently tumbling the rocks on this side of the resort are enough to make us melt into the next level of relaxation. We can't do that just yet, as treatments await. Although we elected to have our services in air conditioned rooms, the tranquility of our previous outdoor experience would not be disturbed. Our new emersion was waiting from the moment we stepped into the treatment rooms complemented with a cold glass of champagne and lovely chocolates. Can we say decadent indulgent relaxation? We

absolutely can. From the 18th century to the 21st century, some things never change. This former residence was built purposefully on this piece of land for all the attributes it has to offer today. A calming, grounding, station by the sea. We are thankful for that and for its enduring existence.

s a matter of fact, we are thankful for all of the elements that make up this classic. Come once and Round Hill will never leave your soul. Come back again and it will become a part of your life and lifestyle. Timeless elegance never goes out of style.

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
